HRE HOLIDAYS AND EXCURSIONS

So far, advance bookings for our UK and Continental holidays are promising, almost ten per cent up on this time last year. Epsom Coaches now has 110 appointed agents so widespread distribution of our brochares within our catchment area is guaranteed. Bookings for our January to April excursions are also doing well with off-season demand continuing to grow over the years. 'Holiday on Ice' has proved to be extremely popular this year, as has 'Singin' in the Bain' and 'Hello Dolly'.

Our new brochure for excursions and coastal express services from May to December will be available during the middle of March and we hope to start distributing copies to our agents the week commencing 19th March. Of particular importance, are the two new picking up points in the centres of New Malden and Mitcham which we hope will increase demand in those areas.

There will be a greater choice of dates for day trips to France than ever before. Also, Dunkirk Shopping and Normandy beaches (extended day) will appear for the first time in this brochure. New day trips include Burghley House and Stamford, Cirencester and the Cotswolds, a choice of two Isle of Wight tours, the Liverpool International Garden Festival, Welsh Borders and Wilton House and Salisbury. Amongst the new afternoon excursions are Clandon Park and Claremont Landscape Garden, Fort Newhaven, Great Dixter, Strawberries and Cream Tea and Sussex Shire Horses. The evening programme includes Bangers and Mash and Honky Tonk pub evenings, the Leeds Castle Firework Display and the unique 'Dugout Experience' being offered by Southampton Tourism to commemorate the D-Day Landings 40th Anniversary participants will be issued with a ration book to be used against food and drink, whilst shelter entertainment and the presence of Fire Wardens, Nurses, etc. completes the picture.

SUR LE CONTINENT!

Somewhat disappointingly, the number of journeys made abroad by our coacnes during 1983 was down on 1982 - 256 journeys in 1983 compared to 273 journeys in 1982. The total number of passengers was also down from 11,909 to 9,969. However, the number of days spent abroad has increased from 437 to 567. The main reason for this drop in the number of journeys abroad is on account of less day trips being made. Last year, we were unable to meet the demand, particularly on Saturdays, as space on the ferries was hard to come by. This year we have been given much more generous allocations on the ferries by P & O so we will be making an all-out effort for private party bookings in addition to offering a greater choice of departures in our May to December brochure. A leaflet detailing 'Day Trips to France for Groups' is now available from the Private Hire department.

BROCHURE WRITE-UPS

The January edition of 'Coaching Journal' contains a more than complimentary feature on our 1984 holidays brochure - "In an excellent brochure containing well presented details of no fewer than 90 tours to nine different countries, a notable feature of the Epsom Coaches programme is the number and variety of special interest tours". The article concludes "With immaculate coaches - I see them around frequently and highly professional and smart drivers, this company enjoys a deservedly high reputation within and well beyond its catchment area".

Our 1984 Holidays brochure also receives a mention in an article entitled 'Vintage Holidays' which appears in the current edition of the 'Money' magazine.

COACH DISPLAYS AND SHOP PROMOTIONS

Following the success of taking a stand in the travel section of W.H. Smith of Sutton, other agents were approached with a view to similarly taking a stand in their shop on a certain day so as to answer any customer queries, etc. The response has been surprisingly good and by the end of March we will have visited about a dozen agents. We have also been out with a coach displaying in the Epsom, Kingston, Wimbledon and Morden town centres and Ken Le Lacheur is representing the Company at the annual 'Herald of Spring' exhibition at Bourne Hall. Leaflets detailing our range of services have also been delivered by the Post Office to all households in the Wimbledon, Morden, Surbiton, Kingston and Twickenham areas.



TO THE MOON AND BACK THREE TIMES

The total fleet mileage in 1983 was 1,450,108 siles (equivalent to three return trips to the moon) compared to 1,433,411 miles in 1982. For those of you interested in statistics, the three drivers with the highest mileages last year were: Peter Walsh - 45,981, Ivan Stanley - 44,738 and Ray Lance - 39,767. In January, the greatest mileage has been clocked up by Alan Trotter with 6,258 miles on account of all those Riviera Express journeys.



TOUR OPERATOR WORK

work from incoming tour operators is showing a healthy increase in 1984. This month, we will be supplying up to 17 coaches a day for the Farm Bureau Insurance groups through Spectra. From 30th September to 5th October, between 30 and 60 coaches a day will be required on transfers and sightseeing excursions for the XVI SICOT Conference (Orthopaedic doctors) at the Barbican Centre as arranged by Conference Services.

Work from JCT, Thomas Cook and Travel Scotland continues to grow and Interopa have coaches booked for 30 groups of 14 days duration each. Maritz have already given us bookings for group movements between March and June which include JCB, General Electric and the Friendly Ice Cream Company and wilkinitours have outlined work up to March 1985 which includes I.T.T. late May and Kenyer in early October. Travel England is handling the New Jersey Bar Associates Conference in November which involves several coach movements per day.

RIVIERA EXPRESS

At the beginning of the month, Roy Richmond flew to Nice to discuss final arrangements for the Riviera Express in the summer. From 4th June to 1st October there will be two departures from London, on Fridays and Mondays. From 6th April, Epsom Coaches will be operating the service straight through to Nice in a reciprocal arrangement with our French equivalent. The fare up to the end of December is £59 oneway, £98 return, including all travel and overnight accommodation in twin rooms with Continental breakfast. Over the New Year, the Riviera Express was included in advertising by French Leave on Channel 4 TV when a picture of our coach appeared.

The visits also enable members of the office staff to see first hand the facilities available to parties.



D-DAY MUSEUM FOR PORTSMOUTH

On 6th June next year, the 40th anniversary of Operation Overlord, the Allied invasion of Europe, the City of Portsmouth opens a new D-Day Museum to coincide with 'D-Day 40', a grand reunion which is already attracting participants from all over the world. The Overlord Embrodery which vividly depicts the invasion will be transferred from its present home in London to a new and permanent home in Portsmouth. There will also be a cinema and display pavilions with weapons, vehicles and other paraphernalia of the home and the military fronts. Portsmouth was the nerve-centre for Overlord. Three and a half million soldiers from 11 countries in the Allied force either embarked from the city's harbours or assembled offshore in boats from ports all over the country. The tactical HO of General Eisenhower is still to be seen on the edge of town at Southwick.
