BOOM IN COACH PASSENGERS ON THE CHANNEL


It is estimated that by the end of this year more people will have travelled abroad by coach than by car. The Dover Harbour Board reckons that coach passengers crossing the Channel in 1983 will number 4.6 million compared with only 4.3 million travelling by car. Day trips to the Continent must account for a large proportion of the growth, and in 1984 Epsom Coaches is planning a greater frequency of departures in the May to December excursions brochure than ever before. A new Day Trips to France leaflet for organisers will be out shortly.

INTERNATIONAL GARDEN FESTIVAL

Britain's first International Garden Festival will be held in Liverpool in 1984 - a cavalcade of colour, fascination and entertainment.

It is costing nearly £30 million, has involved high-speed reclamation of 250 acres of derelict riverside land and will be bigger than the Festival of Britain.
