
Travel Offices


One more game of tennis table and we should be in dock. Really I don't think I can stand this pace much longer - perhaps I'll move to Wiltshire for the quiet life.







News from around the offices....

Coach Hire

Fortunately, 1987 was a big improvement on 1986 — the year when many American groups cancelled at short notice. The start to 1988 is promising, in that there is a slight increase in turnover for January and February compared with last year. On paper the outlook for the rest of the year is good, but as many are American parties there is a danger that some groups may cancel or reduce in number due to bad exchange rates for the Americans.

We have just received four new coaches from Belgium. Quite a turning point in the history of Epsom Coaches as this will be the first time that the complete coach has been manufactured abroad. In recent years we have purchased Volvo chassis (from Sweden) and the bodywork has been carried out by Plaxtons of Scarborough. Unfortunately, the cost and quality of the bodywork produced by Plaxtons is no longer considered competitive.

The new coaches are Van Hool bodywork on Volvo chassis. Each coach has 49 seats, toilet, tea and coffee making facilities, full air-conditioning and plenty of luggage space. At a cost of £105,000 each the coaches represent a very large investment. With the new vehiciles, the fleet will consist of 31 coaches ranging from 20 to 50 seats.

Recently, two new Coach Hire leaflets have been produced to circulate to Group Organisers. One givew ideas for places to visit and the other promotes visits to France for the day. In addition to recommending Boulogne and Calais we are now also including Dunkirk. This is in some ways an experiment, inasmuch as the crossing time is about an hour longer each way. It will be interesting to see if groups are put off by the idea of a longer crossing or encouraged by the opportunity to have more time to relax on board ship.

Workshops

We welcome two new members of staff - Oli (Oliver) Soroghan in the Paintshop and Shaun McCann in the Workshop.

Our thanks to Sid Cannon for his help over winter in the Paintshop.(7 months). Sid is known as 'The Manager' or 'Popeye'.

Bob Shaw has been doing early morning checks and yard work which is a big help to Workshops.
