aeroplane, however small. Falling from a height of a few kilometers, objects attain the speed of a bullet and are thus dangerous to earthly mortals.


5. If you are travelling in an open aeroplane, take a good pair of goggles with you and wear a leather or silk hood to protect


your hair-do.

THE EPSOM TRADITION

There are two sides to our business which can be loosely classified as "Regular Services" and "Private Hire". (Regular Services include holidays, excursions and express services).

We have operated Regular Services since we began in 1920. In the early days we picked up in Ashtead, Epsom, Ewell and Tadworth; visited coastal resorts and race meetings and our services were sold through local newsagents. Today we pick up at 35 points in Surrey, South London and Middlesex; and offer a range of over 400 excursion and holiday destinations with the help of 100 local agents.

Since the last war car ownership has increased resulting in some decline in the demand for coach services. Some coach companies have ceased trading altogether, others have concentrated on private hire.

Running a profitable coach service in the 1980's is not easy and we have expanded into UK and Continental Holiday tours, excursions, coastal and London express services.

Trends

The major growth in recent years has been on holidays — bookings are up by almost a third in less than four years and while the number of passengers on excursions and express services has also increased (up 10 per cent in the same period) this has been due to the enlarged catchment area and demand has tended to fall in established areas.

The demand for commuter services has proved to be limited in this area: we have a regular following and will continue to operate services 1 and 2. Fares which last went up in March 1984, will be pegged for the time being.

Costs

The overheads on Regular Services are considerable and include four persons wages, computer hardware and software, brochures, advertising, stationery, and commission to agents. Advertising our services also benefits private hire and the brochures are a useful reference for organsiers looking for ideas. Small groups can join our advertised departures.

1984

Although we carried 55,000 passengers on our services, 1984 was a disappointing year - the holidays did well but the remainder performed poorly. This was due to many factors including competition from Mitcham Belle and London Country - the latter benefiting from bus grants and fuel subsidies.

On the holidays, we continue to compete with local newspapers arranging their own tours and enjoying subsidised advertising. Deregulation has also resulted in competition from other coach operators including National, Wallace Arnold, Surrey International and Grey Green. Nevertheless we succeed by offering convenience, quality, variety and value for money.

1985

Over the past few months, there has been a quiet revolution on Regular Services — an emphasis on consolidation rather than expansion. Advertising and publicity costs have been greatly reduced; also regrettably we have had to cut down on staff. We are now much leaner and are confident this year will mark a turning point and return to profitability.

Mry to December Excursions

The number of scheduled coach journeys in our May to December programme has been cut from 1500 to 1000. This will result in less "feeders"; also the average number of passengers per coach hopefully will increase from 30 to nearly 40.

The new brochure will be published in early March. Although the cover is in full colour, the inside is printed on newsprint in two colours only - this has reduced costs and we believe the brochure will still be perfectly adequate for its purpose.

For the first time, the 1985 brochure will have a diary format - all the essential information can be found in date order and should make for easier reading.

Long Term View

Each side of the business has its ups and downs and it should be remembered that following the demise of Surrey Motors in 1980 and Duvals in 1982 our services expanded when private hire contracted.

In many ways, our services are less volatile than private hire. Incoming tourism is largely dependent on a favourable rate of exchange.

Carrying on the Tradition

Provided we offer a good service and value for money, our customers are likely to stay loyal to us in good times and bad. Serving people can be very trying but most of the time it is rewarding and our efforts are appreciated, but we can never afford to be complacent in this fast-moving and competitive business, and in 1985 we are anythingbut complacent.
